

I. Introduction

- Hook: Engage the reader with an interesting fact, question, or quote.
- Background Information: Provide brief background information on the topic to give context.
- Thesis Statement: Clearly state your opinion on the topic and preview the main arguments you will present in support of your opinion.

- **Paragraph 1:**
