Kosovo protests 2022

In early 2022, Kosovo saw a wave of protests following a controversial decision by the government to sign a deal with Serbia that would create an association of Serb-majority municipalities within Kosovo. The move was seen as a compromise to improve relations between the two countries but was met with opposition from many Kosovo Albanians, who viewed it as a threat to Kosovo's sovereignty.

The protests began in late January and quickly grew in size and intensity, with demonstrators taking to the streets in several cities across the country. Protesters called for the resignation of the government and the cancellation of the agreement with Serbia.
